Minister's Corner Spring is here, and it's time to talk about fresh flowers. They bring color and life to your space, add a nice touch to any room, and make the perfect gift. If you are a proud grower of a flower garden, you'd probably cut some and take them inside to enjoy color and fragrance. However, one of the pitfalls is the short lifespan of fresh-cut flowers. Thankfully, there are easy ways and simple tricks to make your bouquets last longer. Here are my two cents to extend their longevity: before you put those roses in water, trim 1-2 inches off the end of each steam. And when you put them in the vase, it's important to remove any leaves that fall below the water line to prevent bacterial growth. Start with a clean vase and fill it with room temperature water. When you add ingredients like flower food to the water, make sure they are completely mixed and dissolved before you place the flowers. Change the water, clean the vase, and re-trim the stems every few days. Place your arrangement in a cooler room and keep them out of direct sunlight...With all that said and done, as you well know, cut flowers don't last long! At best, they can last anywhere from 7-12 days if properly cared for. In our daily life, when we stay away from our maker and sustainer, we become like cut flowers. At first, we're still able to shine and glow. Then, slowly, but surely our spirit and energy begin to run out. At that point, we start to look for quick and effective supplements, and does our individualistic and consumeristic culture offer a wide array of those? All kinds of substances, toys, and narratives come to our aid. But just like flower food, they boost but never sustain. Sooner rather than later we start to look for new toys, higher doses, and a different narrative to keep us going. If we stay on this course, the result can be catastrophic. Jesus said: 'I am the bread of life.' Though he said these words just after feeding 5000 people, he did not mean the physical bread, but the bread of spiritual and mental renewal found only in what He, and He only, is able to provide. Accepting Jesus is a decision to believe and appreciate the gift of abundant life for -as He says- 'Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty.' So, why does your life have to be a desert of meaning and purpose, when it can be vibrant fields with all kinds of bright colors and fragrances? Rev.Reine



# The Mission & Outreach Committee

The Mission & Outreach Committee supports the church's goal of spreading the Good News through mission projects and outreach programs. Activities include raising funds for selected charities, reaching out to the community, and responding to personal requests for assistance. Each year the Committee chooses, plans, and presents to the congregation various mission projects. Some are ongoing; some are seasonal, and some are special longer-term projects with larger financial commitments. One ongoing



project is St. Timothy's long-time support of the Heron Emergency Food Centre with regular food and cash donations. The HEFC also receives the product from one of the nine church vegetable garden plots. The garden plots rented out annually represent an initiative of both mission and outreach. Seasonal campaigns help those in need in Ottawa through cash and in-kind donations for The Ottawa Mission and women's centers. St. Timothy's works with Caring and Sharing Ottawa to purchase and deliver Christmas dinner food hampers. The goal of the current special project selected by the Committee is the provision of seed money for small enterprises which will enable a group of women in Cameroon to generate income for their families. The Committee is also responsible for planning an annual Mission Awareness Sunday service. Outreach activities are varied and centered on many forms of communication. The Committee oversees the design and updating of the church website, Facebook page, and Vistas advertising which are important links to the community. The production of the monthly newsletter, Timothy Topics, provides a connection for all members of the congregation. Although limited by the pandemic, Mission & Outreach normally maintains a Welcoming Committee roster to greet newcomers, prepares printed church information packets, and contacts visitors. Planning for in-person Café Connections, a Friday morning time of fellowship and coffee at the church, changed to overseeing Zoom gatherings during the pandemic. Activities of the Mission & Outreach Committee are so varied that there is an opportunity and need for the involvement of everyone. The Committee thanks you for your faithful financial support of St. Timothy's mission projects. You are invited to consider serving on the Committee or assisting with any of the activities of special interest to you.
