Minister's Corner: Some high schools, ask their graduating students to provide a quote they hold dear, live by, or mean a great deal to them to be put in the yearbook next to their picture. What about you, do you have a favorite saying, wisdom, or quote? For the largest part of our human experience, we exist and function in the practical domain or aspect of life. Daily commitments, bills, deadlines, assignments, grocery shopping, meals, property maintenance, taxes, doctor visits, and so on make up a sizable block of our daily routine...And when we have a chance to part from this never-ending list, we like to take time for ourselves to rest and recharge. But here is the point, whether it's work or play we are involved in, we need some kind of an intellectual substructure for everything else to stand on. We need a foundation, a value system, or a life philosophy so we can make sense of what we're busy accomplishing at the moment and gauge our long-term goals. And it is very understandable when we have too much on our plate and just want to pull through our to-do list, it sounds like a total waste of time to ponder the meaning of life or a value system. But the fact remains when we don't connect existence, meaning, and happiness with virtues and beliefs, we will be flying blind on empty tanks. When schools ask graduate students for a motto or a quote to put in the yearbook, it comes at a time when they are really struggling and stressed to meet all kinds of deadlines. No one wants to do it at that point, but when they look back, they realize how important it was to stop for a little while, take a breath, and consider the foundation upon which they wish to build a meaningful structure for the future. This is why it is very important that we find the time to move from the practical or businesslike aspect of life to the analytical, intellectual, or spiritual aspect -however you call it- so we walk in the light and have the energy to persevere because we see and, to some extent, understand the bigger picture. So, what is your philosophy in life? What do you use to knit together a value system to live by? In the OT, the book of Proverbs, we hear the words of divine wisdom that is the wisdom of God personified and inviting us: "Come, eat my bread and drink the wine I have mixed. Leave your folly behind, and you will live; walk in the way of understanding." In the NT, the book of John, Jesus picks up this theme and identifies himself as the bread and wine that will help people live and understand. Surely, there will always be many ways and different beliefs to embrace, but you will want something that endures, something that can anchor you and give you meaning when everything else becomes shallow and empty. Jesus uses the word TRUE, he says: I am the TRUE bread and wine. He sets this bread over against all other breads. This is a brief synopsis of the duties of the Board of Managers:

Church Matters, Pay all invoices and salaries.

Keep Church Property in good condition. Count and Bank the Offerings each Sunday.

Provide envelopes for donors and provide statements of their givings in a year-end tax receipt, and oversee the PAR program.

Keep the congregation informed of the financial situation of the congregation.

Prepare a year-end Financial Report, and with the Session, develop a budget for the next year.

Appoint and outline the duties of the church custodian and church secretary

Via Personnel Committee, consult paid personnel annually concerning contracts and salaries.

Put insurance in place and ensure premiums are paid in a timely manner
