Minister's Corner It's been said that the question that answers every other question is the one of identity: 'Who am I?' Identity is a sense of self and sense of worth; together they make your identity. So, where does a sense of self and selfworth come from? Achievement and merit surface quickly when we ask this question. Accomplishments, experience, and abilities set us apart from everyone else and give us a strong sense of identity. However, C.S Lewis in Mere Christianity says, 'We are not really proud of having money, we are proud of having money more than the next person. We are not proud that we are smart, we are proud of being smarter, we are not proud of being good-looking, we are proud of looking better than the next person.' For example, think of a violinist in a small town. He is the local star and acknowledged talent until he travels to the big city and finds that his sense of identity must undergo change. The pool he is competing with there is more competitive and exclusive. So, a merit-based sense of identity is necessary and practical, yet volatile and shaky. Any identity that is achieved rather than received is not only exclusive (you are richer and smarter than the rest of the pool), but risky as well. It can be taken away from us in the blink of an eye and puts us in tension with those around us all the time. In the Christian faith, we believe every individual possesses inherent worth and value due to their reflection of divine characteristics (the image of God). This divine imprint grants us a special dignity and a higher purpose. Karl Barth teaches that human worth and dignity are not earned but are gifts bestowed by God's love and mercy. Learning this, we don't only recognize our sense of worth but also recognize the divine worth in every individual, regardless of their background, abilities, or circumstances. So, next time you come across the question: 'Who am I?' remember Genesis 1:27: 'God created humankind in his image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them.' Rev. Reine.
